RE: Fully Funding The SAFER Drinking Water Program

Dear Governor Newsom, Pro Tem Limon, and Speaker Rivas:

We, the undersigned organizations, representing the environmental justice community, local and regional government entities, local water districts, and the regulated

Industry **respectfully requests that the upcoming budget reactivate the General Fund backfill for the SAFER program.** We urge the Legislature and Governor to fully fund SAFER to its original \$130 million annual allocation to help address pressing drinking water needs and long-term solutions.

The SAFER program is particularly unique and effective among Cap-and-Invest programs. Specifically, when the SAFER Program was originally established via SB 200 (Monning, 2019) to facilitate drinking water solutions, it was the only program with a general backfill provision among those funded by Cap-and-Trade (now Cap-and-Invest). This original backfill provision is still in statute ([Health and Safety Code § 116766\(g\)](#)) and highlights the recognized importance of stable funding for drinking water solutions. However, the recent Cap-and-Invest extension, [SB 840 \(2025\)](#), did not update the reference to the backfill provision statute. It is our understanding that during the recent Cap-and-Invest extension negotiations, the SAFER backfill provision was not discussed. Thus, the SAFER Program is now susceptible to significant volatility because it is entirely dependent on Cap-and-Invest auction revenues. That is contrary to the needs of a capital funding program, which requires stable revenues over a number of years to ensure successful projects.

When fully funded at the \$130 million annual allocation, SAFER has been a remarkably successful program. Since SAFER began facilitating drinking water solutions, the number of Californians receiving unsafe drinking water from their public water systems has declined from about [1.6 million](#) to approximately [600,000](#) in 6 years. This approximately 63% reduction is a testament to significant progress and a hallmark of a proven program that warrants continued public investment. Underfunding the SAFER Program below its original \$130 million allocation will undermine California's recent historic strides in water justice led by Governor Newsom and the Legislature.

Such uncertainty undermines the program's goals and its effectiveness in advancing long-term drinking water solutions for vulnerable communities facing pressing water challenges. The Department of Finance's forecast in the [January 2026 Budget Proposal](#) project that, over the next four years, SAFER will face a reduction of nearly \$100 million, including a 30% reduction for the coming year. Moreover, the California Air Resources Board's [proposed regulations](#) for the Cap-and-Invest program project that revenues will soon decline significantly and will never fully fund SAFER post-2030. Without the stability of a General Fund backfill, these shortfalls will significantly impede further progress toward safe drinking water access, as SAFER has been instrumental in facilitating

projects in underserved communities. Notably, SAFER is one of the few consistent funding sources for technical assistance in communities that would otherwise have difficulty securing state and federal funding for drinking water solutions.

Our coalition appreciates your consideration and welcomes the opportunity to discuss further. However, **we urge the Legislature and Governor Newsom to prioritize and reactivate the general fund backfill for the SAFER Program in this year's budget.**
